

In addition, two Federation Fedovation Impact Grants have supported Shabbat and holiday programming over the last few years. During the current pandemic, Federation awarded Plough Towers an urgent needs grant and many of the agency's Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and other Covid-related needs have been funded by generous Jewish Foundation of Memphis Donor-Advised Fund holders. The Jewish Foundation also holds two endowment funds on behalf of Plough Towers.
